Wow! It's already August. Where has the summer gone? Parents and children are anticipating the start of school, while some of us are getting ready for the football season. I remember those preseason practice so well. The players and the coaches were practically the only people on campus. We ate, lived, and breathed football 24 hours a day for two weeks. All of us were working together for a common goal, the opening of the season. Those were good times. The Knights aren't that much different; all of us work together for a common goal. Think how much we can accomplish.

The Church has two important feast days in August. On August 6<sup>th</sup> we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration. Jesus, Peter, James, and John went up the mountain to pray, when Jesus was transformed, and a voice came down from above proclaiming Jesus as his son. The apostles still didn't understand the

difference between the Kingdom of God and an earthly kingdom. They would understand soon enough. In his homily several years ago, Father Leo suggested that a second Transfiguration occurred on Calvary. # SCRIBE/EDITOR'S REPORT



I saw an interesting article (which I was notified of by email) in the publication The Catholic Thing (founded in 2008) called "The Catholic Bogeyman" (link to the article and the Wikipedia page cited in the article will be at the end of this report) and I figured that it would make a good August topic to write about, especially in light of the recent sacrilege that was a part

of the opening ceremonies in Paris.

Despite the proud and noble history of Catholic men in the United States (and if you have forgotten, I attend fourth-degree encourage you a to exemplification, hopefully the next master will continue the notion of having one centrally located in Suffolk County) both laws and attitudes against Catholics were commonplace since colonial times. The Catholic colony of Maryland established the Maryland Toleration Act, granting religious freedom to all. However, under Protestant control in 1655, that act was repealed and outlawing Catholics. Then in 1692, Maryland established the Church of England as their official church. Wikipedia states that it, "forced Catholics to pay heavy taxes towards its support. They were cut off from all participation in politics and additional laws were introduced that outlawed the Mass, the church's sacraments, and Catholic schools."

Even during the Revolutionary War, with Catholics fighting for the nation's independence, various states still maintained their anti-Catholic stance. In the article from The Catholic Thing it states, "Anti-Catholicism continued after the Revolutionary War, though Catholics fought alongside Washington. Priests were allowed to cross the Potomac River and celebrate Sunday Mass in Saint Mary's Church in Alexandria. But Virginia law prevented them from spending the night."

Even after the ratification of the Constitution with the First Amendment the problem took decades to allow religious freedom for Catholics because the amendment originally only applied to the Federal government (this would change after the Civil War). The burning of churches and convents in various cities

was commonplace. In 1834, a mob set fire to an Ursuline convent in Charlestown, Massachusetts. In 1844 anti-Catholic rioters in Philadelphia torched churches.

And while it is not illegal for faithful Catholics to receive the sacraments or for Catholic churches to be burned to the ground, such attitudes continue to this day. One only must peruse the posts of X (formerly Twitter) to see the hatred of some towards the Catholic Church.

I realize that this may sound like a depressing article, but I think the opposite should be the case. We should rejoice that we suffer for the sake of the Church. (Acts 5:41 "So they left the presence of the Sanhedrin, rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of the name.")

### HISTORICAL DATES IN AUGUST

**August 1, 1838** - Slavery was abolished in Jamaica. It had been introduced by Spanish settlers 300 years earlier in 1509.

August 1, 1944 - Anne Frank penned her last entry into her diary. "[I] keep on trying to find a way of becoming what I would like to be, and what I could be, if...there weren't any other people living in the world." Three days later, Anne and her family were arrested and sent to Nazi concentration camps. Anne died at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp on March 15, 1945, at age 15.

**August 2, 1776** - In Philadelphia, most of the 55 members of the Continental Congress signed the parchment copy of the <u>Declaration of Independence</u>.

**August 3, 1492** - Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, with three ships, *Nina*, *Pinta* and *Santa Maria*. Seeking a westerly route to the Far East, he instead landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island.

**August 5, 1861** - President <u>Abraham Lincoln</u> signed into law the first Federal income tax, a 3 percent tax on incomes over \$800, as an emergency wartime measure during the <u>Civil War</u>. However, the tax was never actually put into effect.

August 6-10, 1787 - The Great Debate occurred during the Constitutional Convention. Outcomes included the establishment of a four-year term of office for the President, granting Congress the right to regulate foreign trade and interstate commerce, and the appointment of a committee to prepare a final draft of the Constitution.

August 9, 1945 - The second Atomic bombing of Japan occurred as an American B-29 bomber headed for the city of Kokura, but because of poor visibility then chose a secondary target, Nagasaki. About noon, the bomb detonated killing an estimated 70,000 persons and destroying about half the city.
